Outdoor starter facilities can operate, providing that all physical distancing measures are adhered to and appropriate hygiene measures are put in place.
Clubhouse Facilities – locker rooms and toilets	All clubhouse facilities may open. Access to, and use, of changing rooms and showering facilities is permitted (other than in Level 4 areas where indoor facilities should remain closed) if appropriate risk assessment and hygiene measures have been put in place. However, the safety of participants is the priority and facility operators should consider whether use of the areas is necessary.
